Focus on Bill Kimmel...

My eulogy to Bill, given at his funeral (May 2015)...

For those of you who don't know me, I'm Daryl Gerke, Bill's friend and business partner for almost 40 years.

When Bill's daughter asked me to say a few words, I told her it would be a privilege. But when she told me I only had about five minutes, I knew it would be a huge challenge.

You see, I could go on for hours with wonderful stories about Bill... and given the opportunity, probably would. Those of you who do know me know that's true.

As an aside, Bill and I spent many pleasant hours telling, and then retelling stories... often to the chagrin of our wives. I will miss that.

So what can I say in just a few minutes? As I reflected on this, I was finally able to distill it down to three key points I'd like to share today.

(1) Bill was highly respected

The highest accolade an engineer can give to another engineer is to say, "So and so is a good engineer." Sometimes for emphasis, one is called a "darn good engineer." We engineers are such an emotional bunch.

As the e-mails and phone calls poured in after the news of Bill's passing, those phrases were repeated many times. Often with examples of how Bill had jumped in to difficult situations... helped out... and even saved their bacon.

Past students lauded his abilities to take complex concepts and make them easy to understand.

Of course, I agree with those sentiments... Working together for 40 years, I know of no better practitioner of the engineering profession.

(2) Bill was extremely gracious

In a business where giant egos sometimes reign, Bill was modest to a fault. When I shared a comment with him several weeks ago that someone had called him a "rock star", he chuckled and replied, "Gee, I just thought I was doing my job." ... Classic Bill.

Bill also willingly shared what he knew. Not only with clients, but with colleagues and even complete strangers.

An e-mail from a professor in the UK told how, in the middle of his battle with cancer, he took the time to discuss the impact of some new standards. It was much appreciated... He was literally known around the world.

A phone call from a vendor told how he took the time at a trade show last fall to talk with the woman's son about a career in engineering, and how much it meant to both of them... She had only met Bill earlier that day.

(3) Bill was a friend to ALL

I'm biased, of course... What started out as a couple of young engineers collaborating on some moonlighting projects blossomed into a friendship that lasted almost 40 years... Personally, I can think of nobody else who would have been a better friend and a better business partner.

He also leaves behind a multitude of friends in our engineering community... The many e-mails and phone calls in the past week have constantly expressed this sentiment... About what a good friend he had been, and how much he will be missed.

In closing, I'd like to share one particularly eloquent e-mail I received from one of those friends just after Bill's passing.

I'm not much of a reader, but one time my Rabbi lent me a book to read. It was by Rabbi Harold S. Kushner, the author of "Why Bad Things Happen to Good People". I never finished it, but I remember one passage:

As most clergy do, the Rabbi liked to learn about other faiths. He was at some kind of convention or conference, and he heard the Buddhists talking about how you shouldn't get attached to anyone, because you would only lose them eventually...

Rabbi Kushner disagreed... He said that isn't living... Rather, we should allow ourselves to love people even though it will be painful when we lose them... That is living.

So I'm doing a little living right now, over Bill. (Thanks – Jeff Silberberg)

Right now, I think we are ALL doing a little living over Bill... REST IN PEACE, my friend!

What Next ???

Bill Kimmel's passing was a grim reminder that life is not infinite. So I've been reassessing what to do next. Here are my current thoughts.

Kimmel Gerke Associates...

- Consulting - Decrease the consulting that involves travel, but stay involved with EMC training.

I have been handing off new out of town consulting projects to select colleagues. The objectives are to support our clients, while helping other EMC consultants. (Contact me for more info.)

I remain available for in-office consultations (such as design reviews) and local consultations.

– *Training* - Staying involved with training. I really enjoy EMC training, and it gives the most bang for the buck for helping others. More effective to work with ten or twenty at a time than just one or two.

My current goal is to limit classes to no more than one a month, a decrease from the past. So far, so good. These include both in-house and public classes.

Recently added the *EMC in Military Systems* class (partnered with the Applied Technology Institute), along with the popular *Design for EMC* class (partnered with Tektronix for over 20 years).

JumpToConsulting...

Started a blog (www.jumptoconsulting.com) on consulting five years ago as a creative project. The blog now has over 175 posts. Also presented short tutorials on consulting, and helped several make their own JumpToConsulting.

This has been very satisfying. Efforts are underway to increase this activity – post more, and develop an on-line class. An introductory e-book is on the wish list, along with some magazine articles.

Still considering the book I've always promised myself to write. After a couple of EMC books, I don't need it for the ego boost, but it would be fun to do.

Personal...

Goof off more and enjoy life. Play with the dog and hit the road in the RV. Read more books. Revisit ham radio.

Thanks to the consulting business, I no longer need to work. Just very grateful for my success in the wacky world of EMI/EMC.

It has been great fun, and I've enjoyed meeting and helping so many people – a sentiment that Bill also shared.

So thank you all, and please keep in touch!

Consider In-house EMC Training... You may have noticed the public class schedule has shrunk in the past few years.

Due to the economy, revenues are down as companies tighten training and travel budgets. At the same time, the expenses (promotion, hotels, catering, etc.) continue to go up. Thus, we cut back the public classes.

Simply stated, the old public model no longer works. And while I really enjoy teaching, this is still a business and the classes must carry their own weight.

NO, I am NOT getting out of the public training business. I plan to continue with public classes, but at a reduced level from the past.

The NEW EMPHASIS is on IN-HOUSE CLASSES...

So if you want to take advantage of almost 50 years of industry experience combined with personally teaching over 5,000 students, call to get on the schedule.

But don't wait too long. I won't be doing this forever. With Bill's passing, I've already cut back. And at my age, I'm pretty sure I won't be doing this 20 years from now.

BREAK-EVEN is about 12 students... You can have up to 30 students at a fixed fee (no per-seat fees). You provide the training space, A/V, and refreshments. I provide the materials and instructor (me.)

The materials can be tailored to focus on your particular problems. See the last page for examples of past classes.

Design reviews can be added. About 80% of the in-house classes include this one-day option.

Don't have 12 students? Share a "hybrid" class with other local companies. Similar to an in-house class, but I request only one payment (you work out the money split.) I've done several such classes with good success.

The PAYBACK for EMC training is there... Save one trip to the test lab, and you have probably recovered ALL the class fees. Any savings after that are 100% profit.

But it is not just test savings. One client told us that preventing just one equipment shutdown saved \$50K. Another client told us that getting to market one month early was - as the credit card people say - *priceless!*
